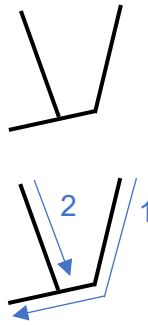

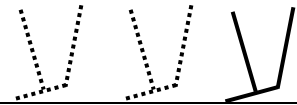
Another letter: The letter Ayin. It's another silent letter, like Aleph.

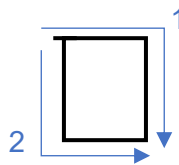
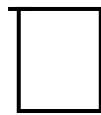

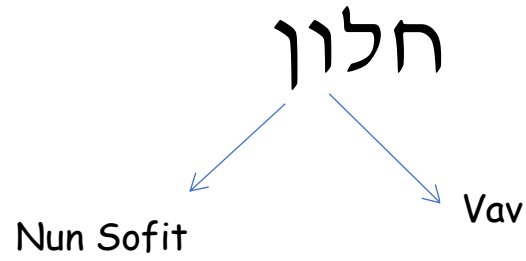
Pay attention: “Nun sofit” looks like “Vav”. The difference is that “Nun sofit” is longer, it crosses down the line.



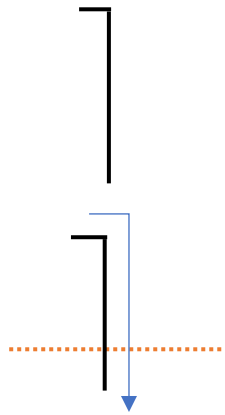
